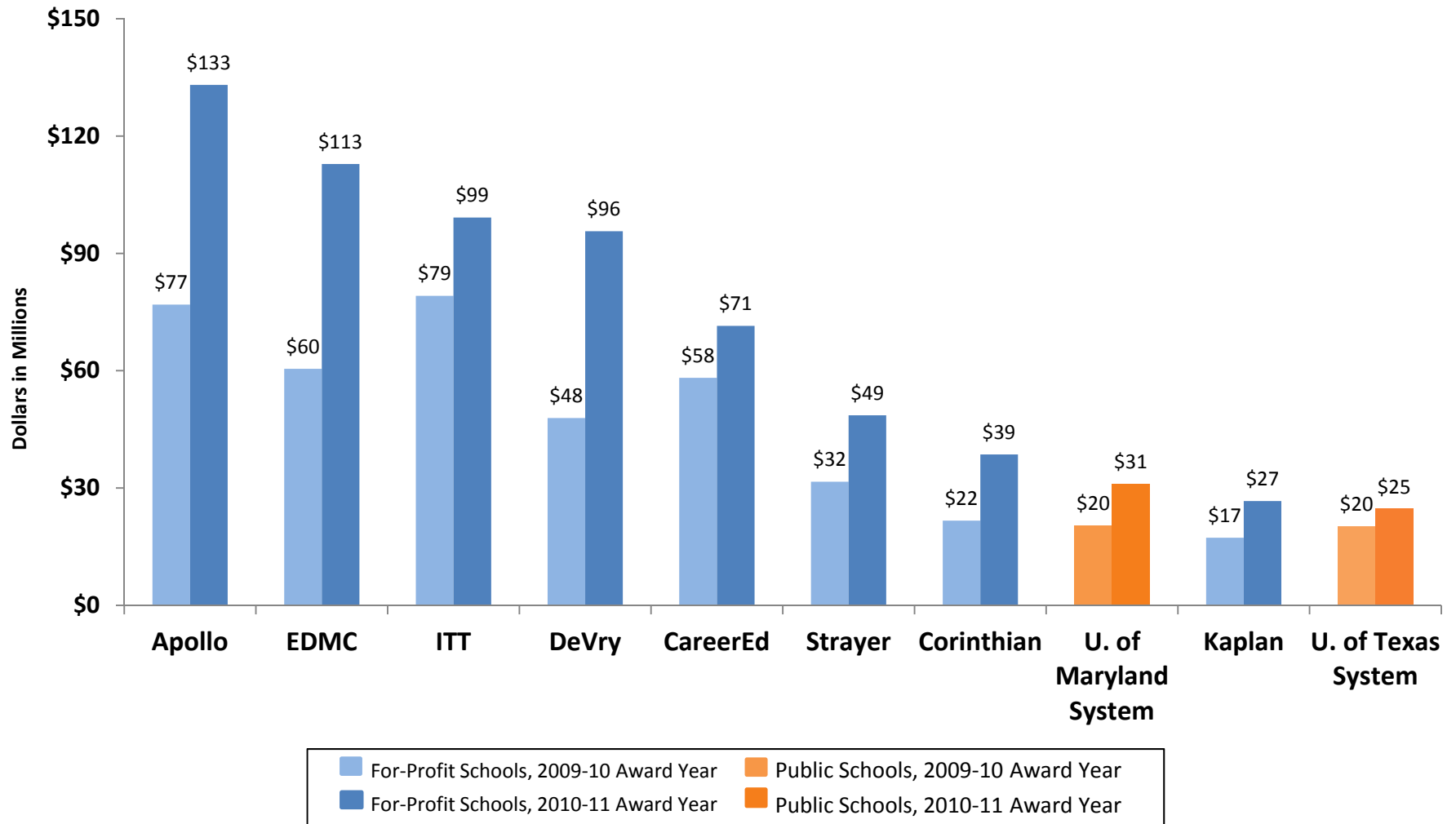

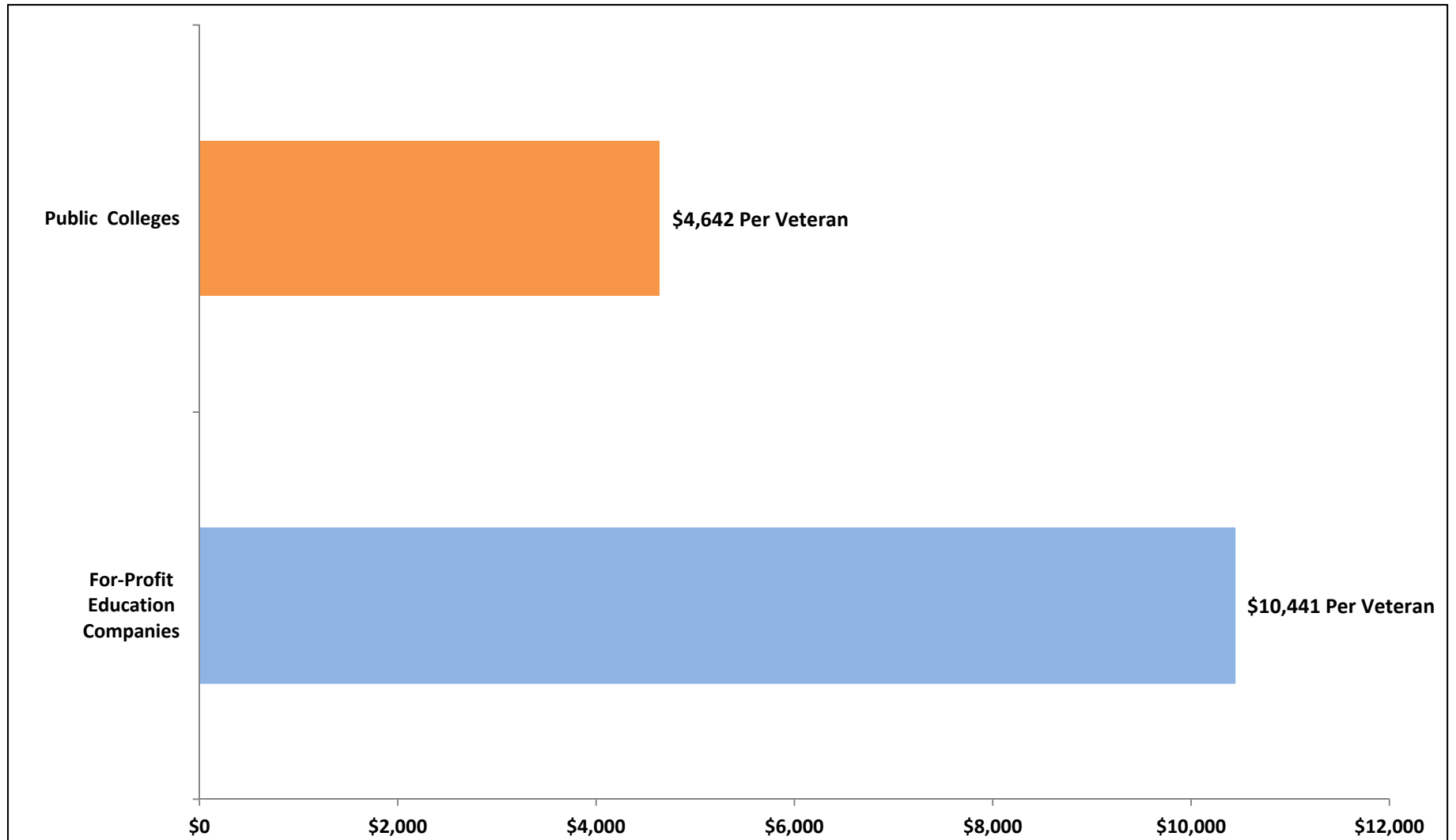

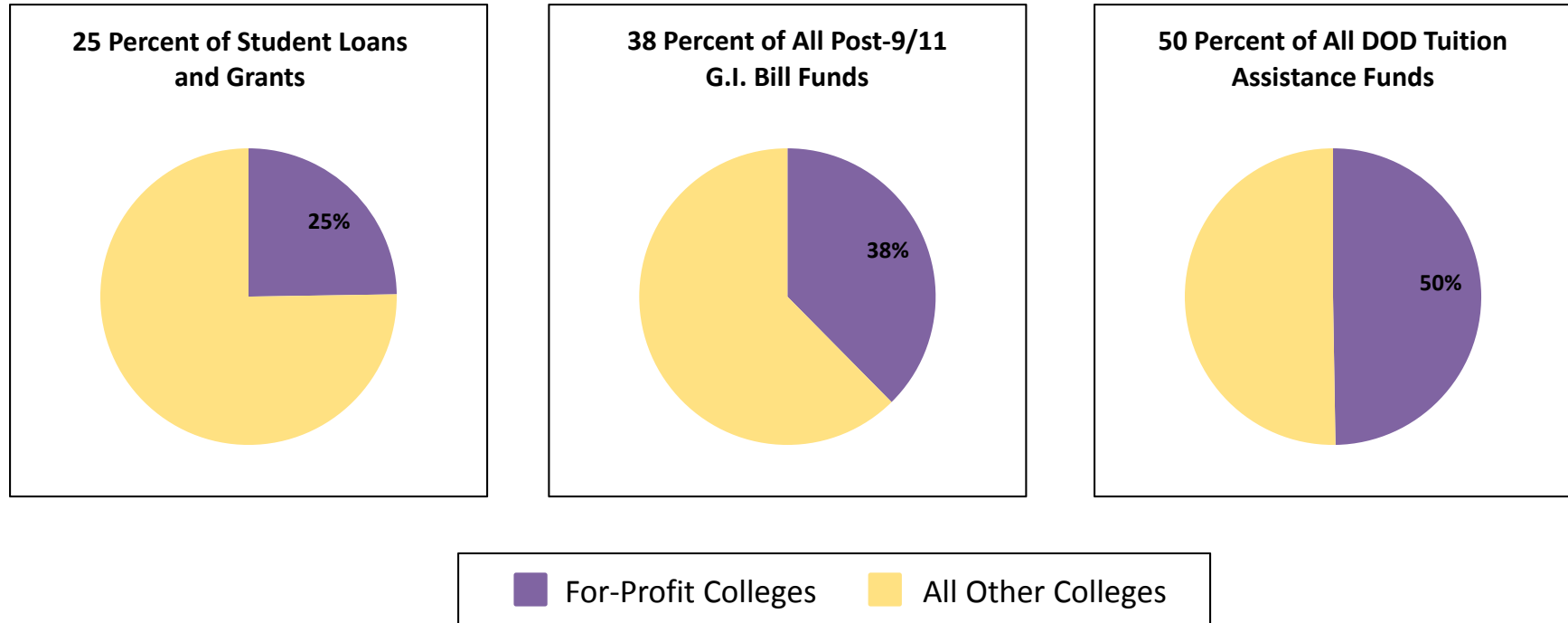

Taxpayers Spend More than Twice as Much to Train Veterans at For-Profit Colleges



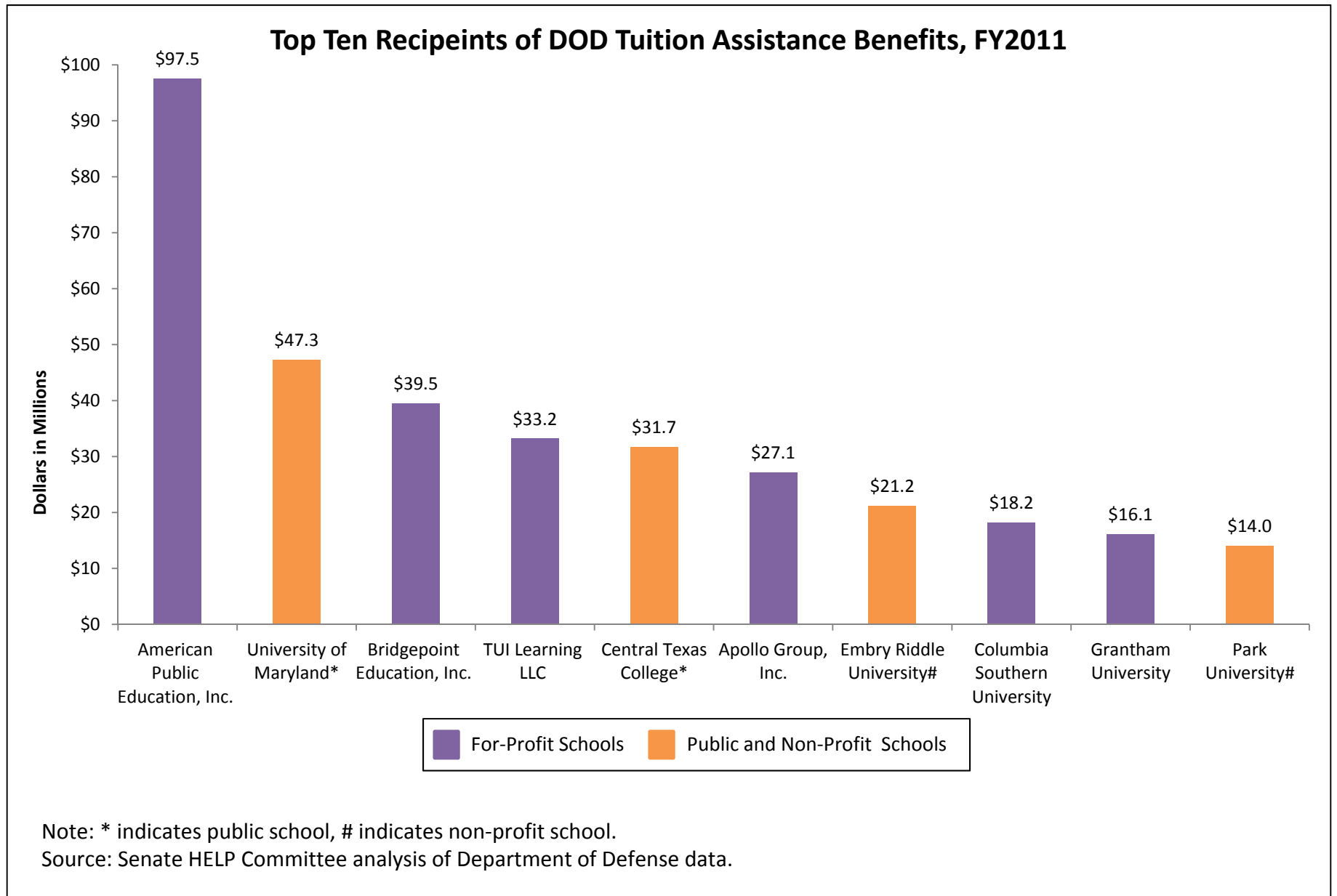

Students at For-Profit Colleges are 13 Percent of All College Students But Receive ...

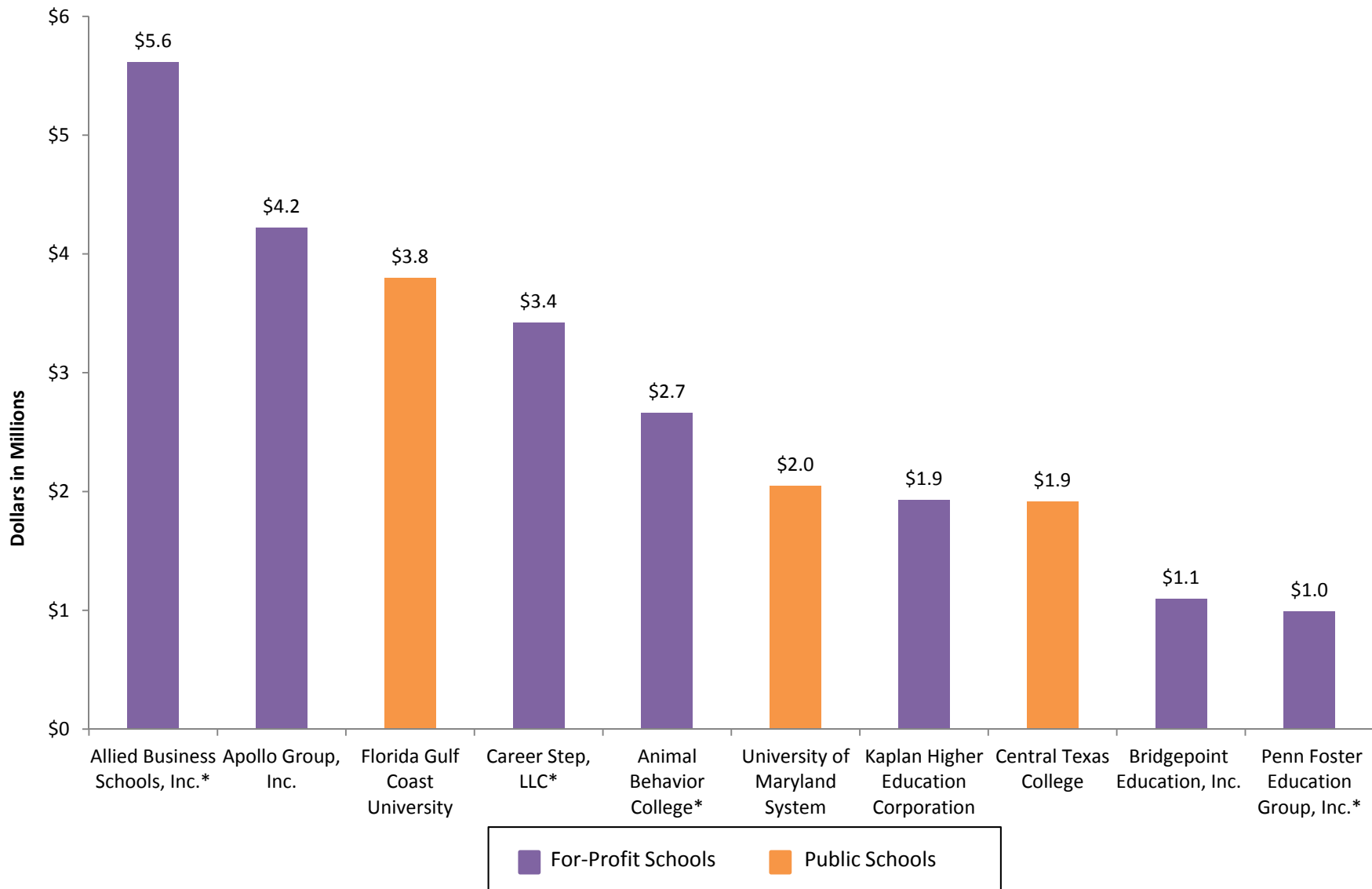

Where are Department of Defense Tuition Assistance Dollars Going?



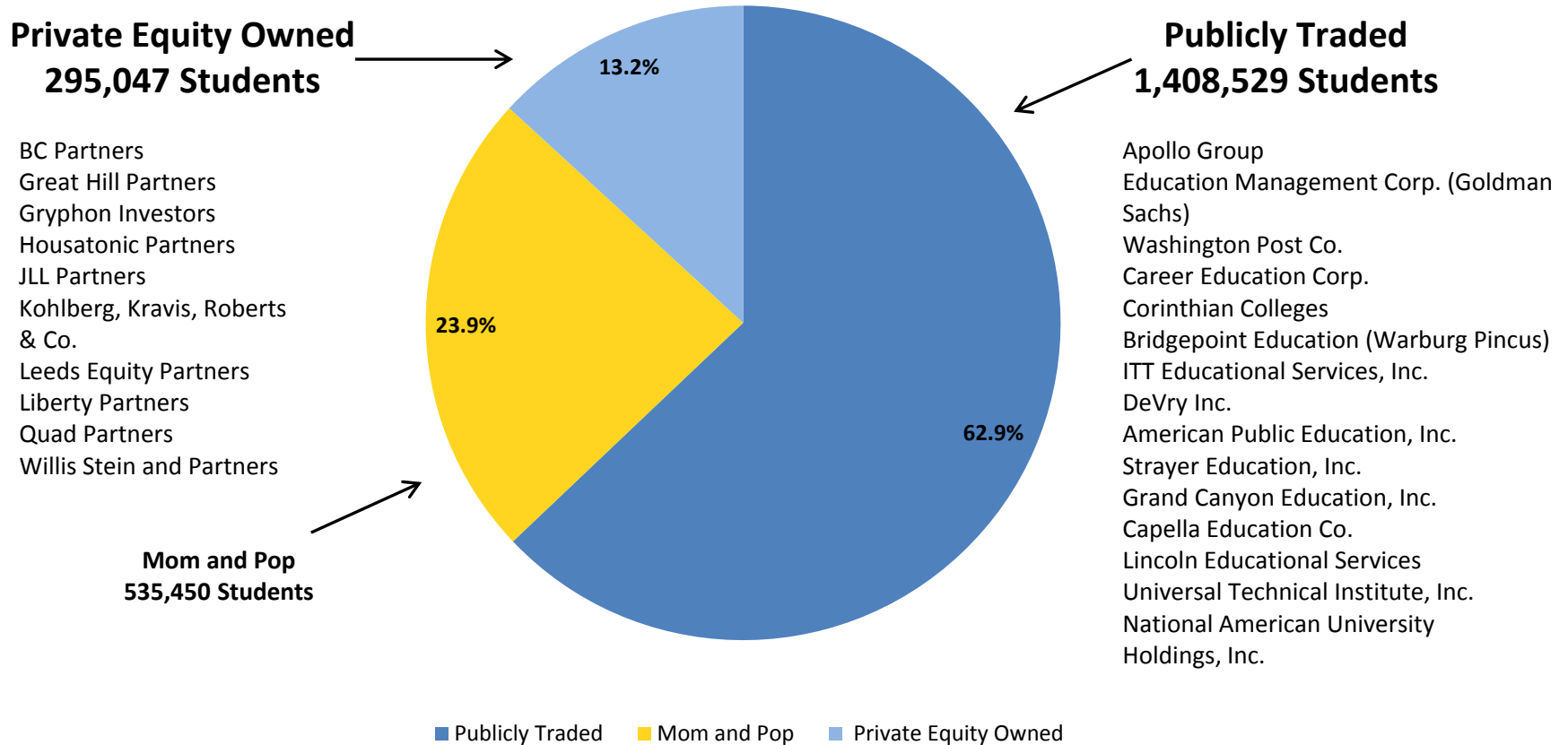
Top Ten Recipients of DOD MyCAA Benefits, FY2011

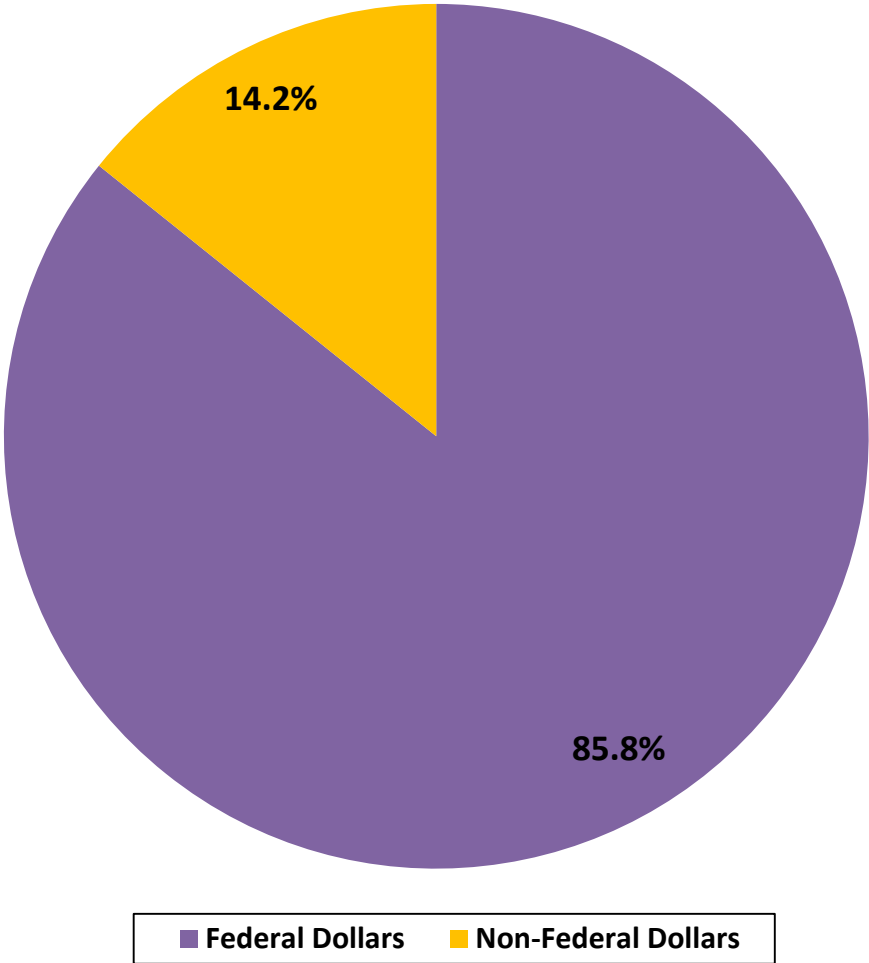
76 Percent of For-Profit College Students Attend Schools that are Wall Street Owned

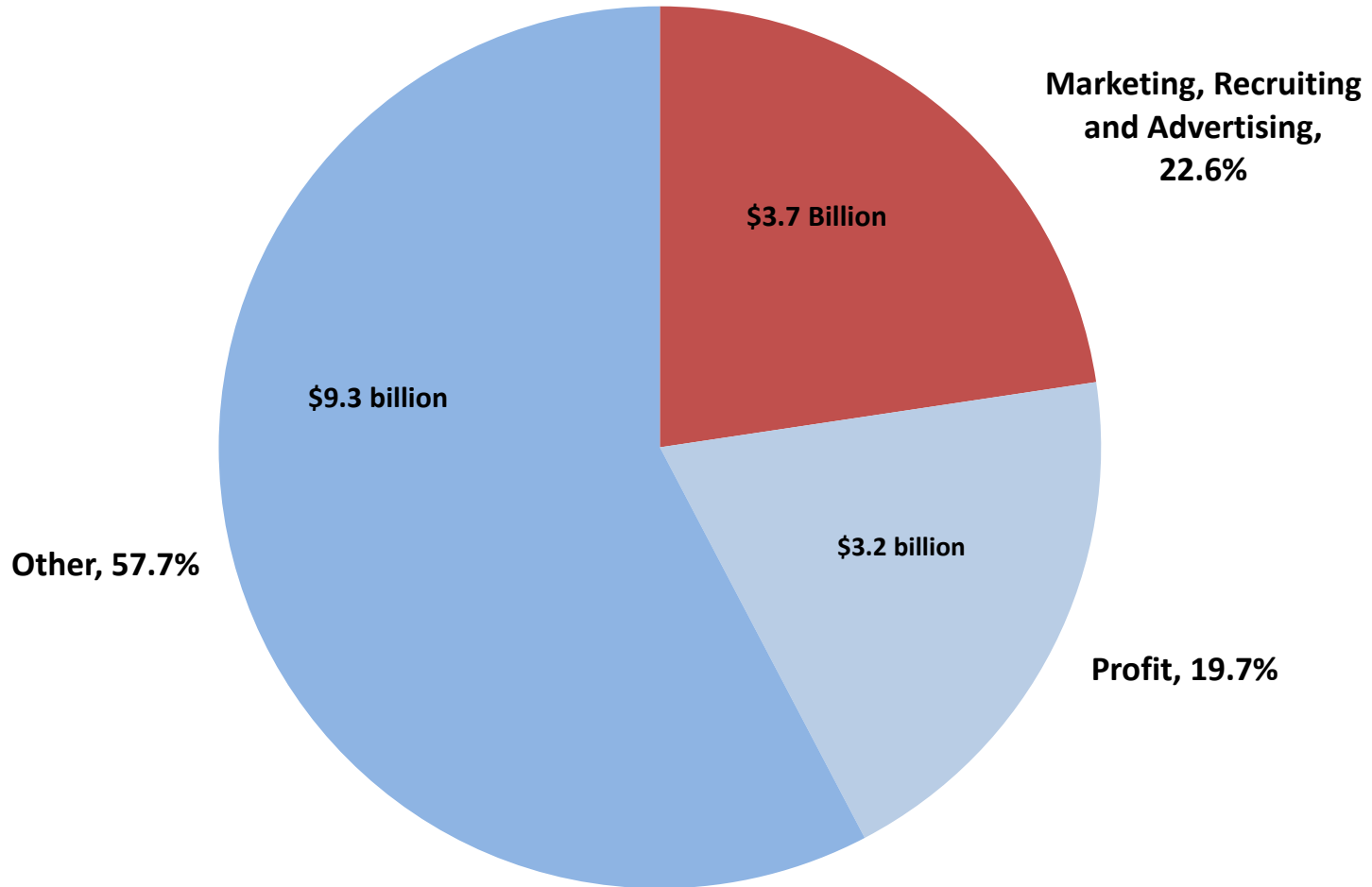
Revenue at 15 Publicly Traded For-Profit Education Companies, 2009

Spending at 15 Publicly Traded For-Profit Education Companies, 2009

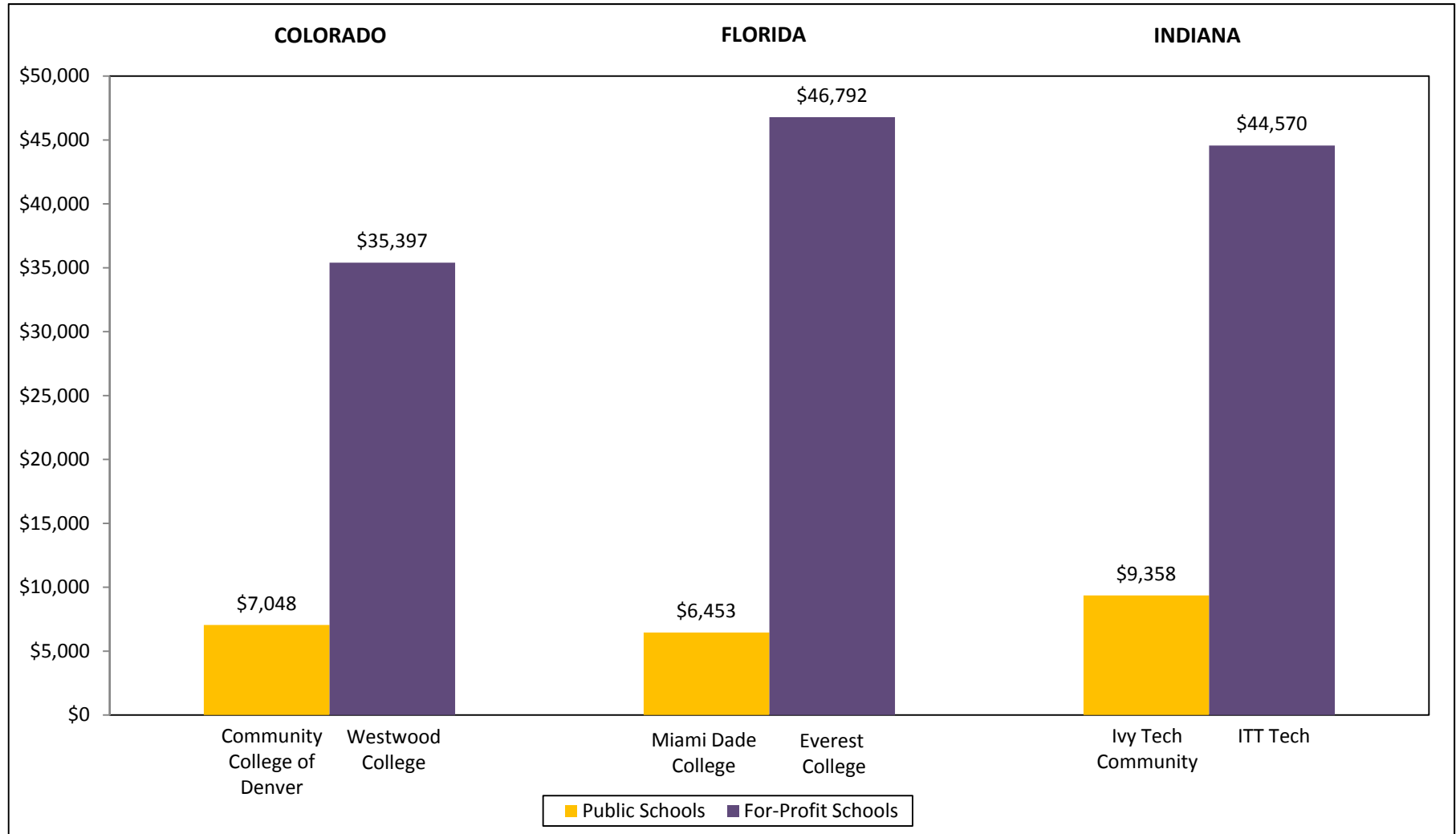

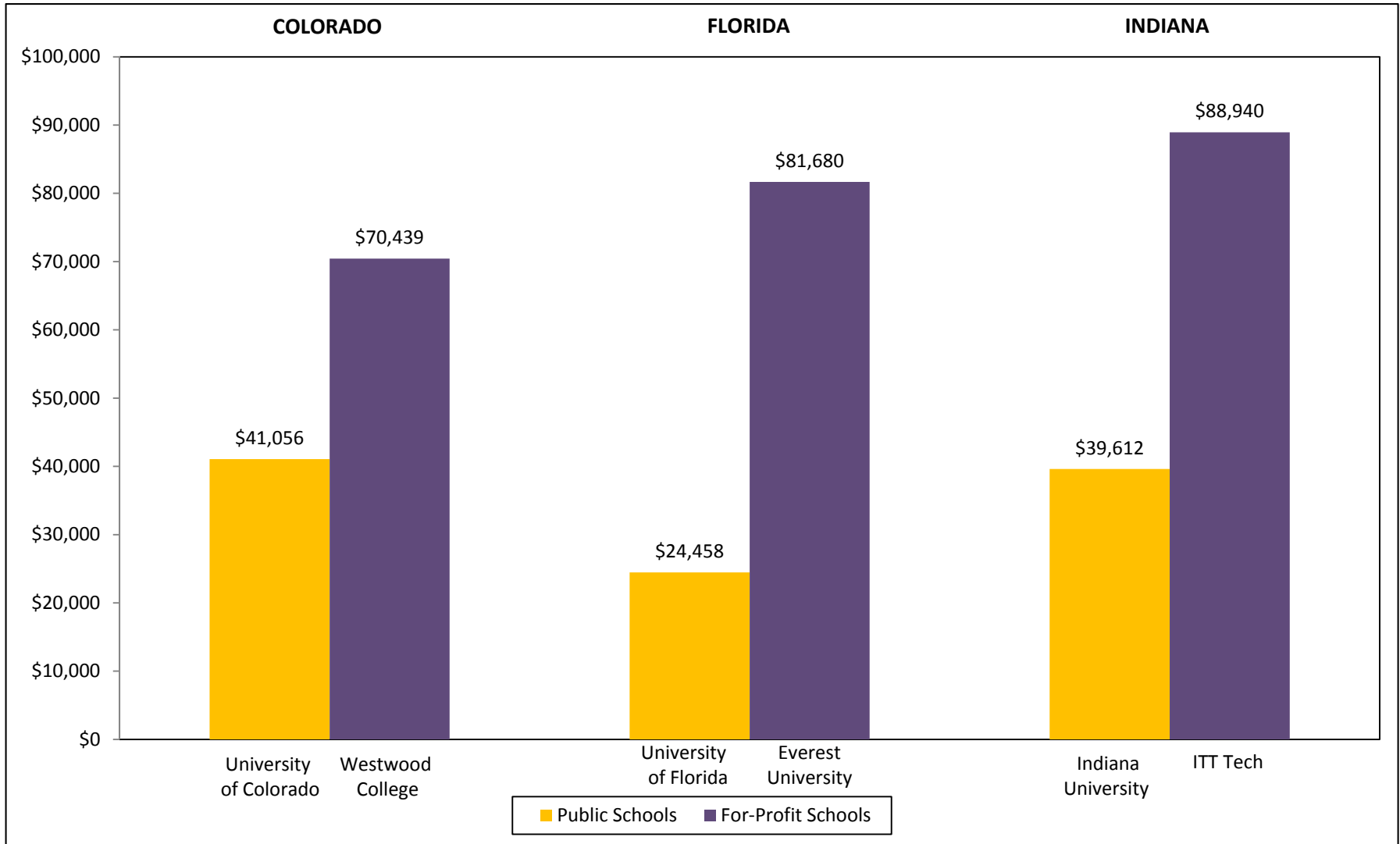

Cost of Associate Degree Business Programs – Community College v. For-Profit College



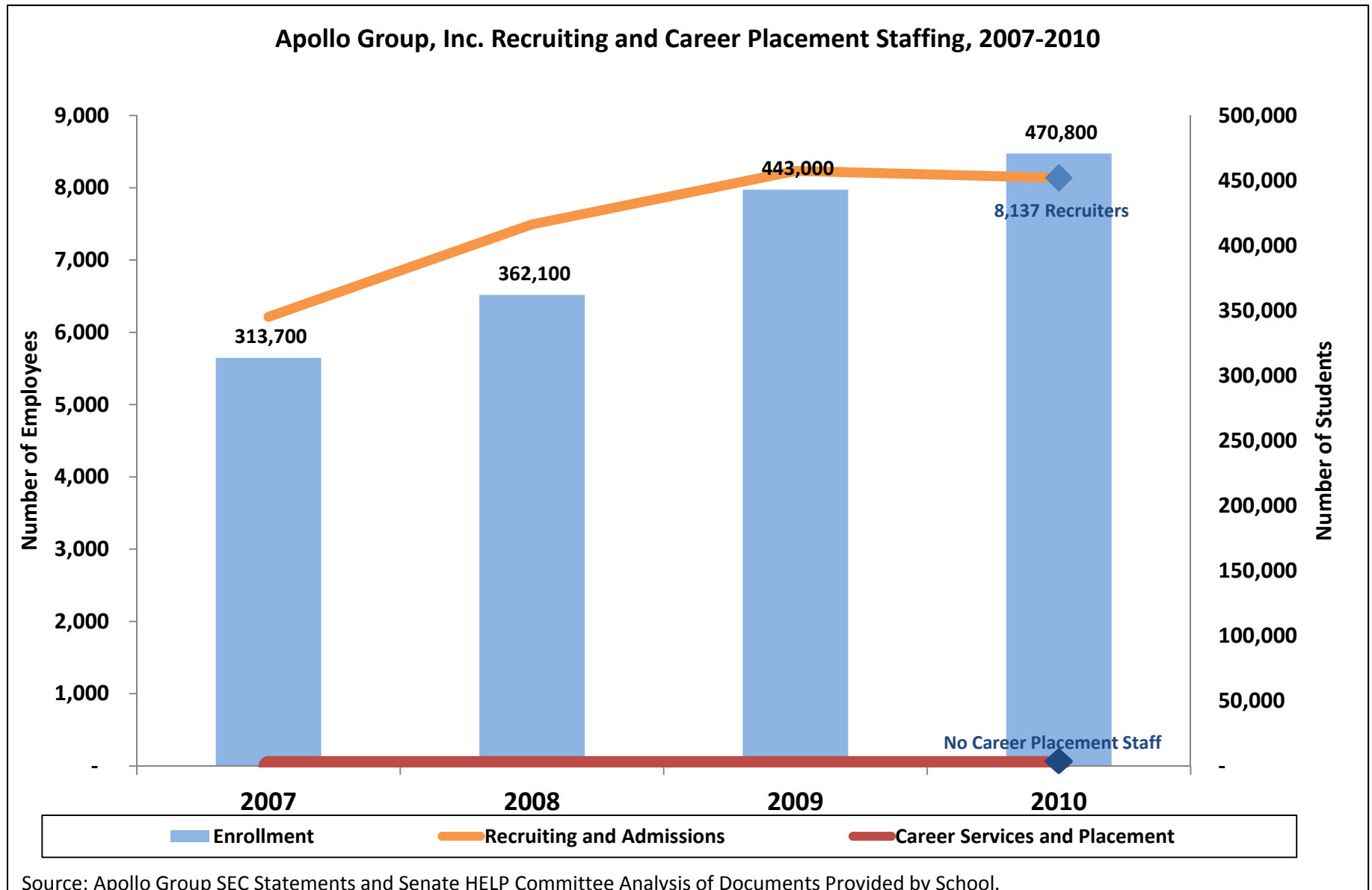

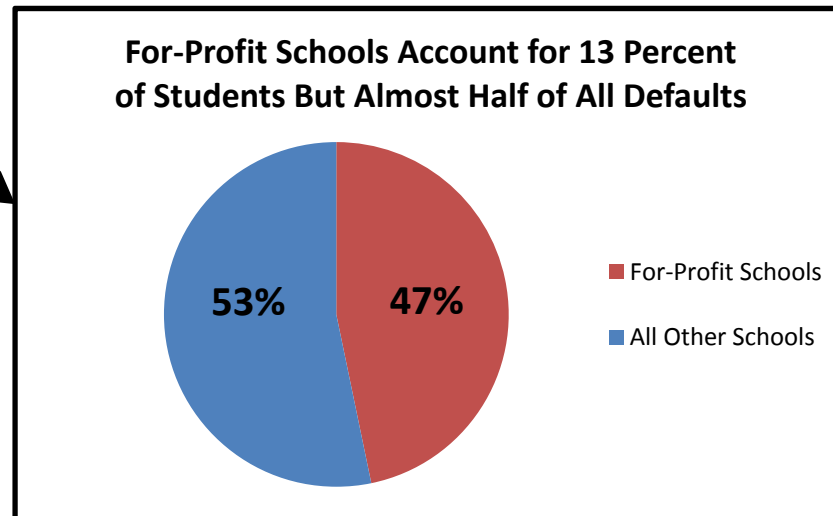

Public Schools	166,571	1,715,377	9.7%
Private, Non-Profit Schools	51,269	757,004	6.8%
For-Profit Schools	191,922	859,597	22.3%
All Schools	410,032	3,339,554	12.3%
